TOWNSHIP BOARD APPROVES AUTO-OWNERS REZONING

The Township Board of Trustees acted at their October 9th meeting to approve the rezoning request from Auto-Owners Insurance Company. Both the Planning Commission and Township Board held public hearings to hear comments regarding the rezoning request.

Auto-Owners requested that the 311.52 acre property that it owns south of Clark Road and I-69, west of DeWitt Road, and north of Stoll Road be rezoned from the A (Agricultural) zoning district to the POD (Planned Office Development) zoning district. Auto-Owners intends to build their corporate headquarters on the property in the future.

The next step will be for Auto-Owners to develop a site plan that shows the proposed locations of buildings, parking areas, landscaping, and other improvements on the property. The site plan will be subject to review and approval of the Township Planning Commission. TOWNSHIP VOTERS RENEW POLICE/FIRE MILLAGE

Township citizens voted at the August 8th primary to renew the millage for police and fire protection services. Township voters have approved this special voted millage since 1977. The millage levy is broken down as 1 mill for police services and 1 mill for fire services. The revenue raised by this millage goes towards funding the Police and Fire Departments of DeWitt Charter Township. For 2005, the millage funded approximately 36% of the fire budget and 30% of the police budget.

The millage rate has never been increased from the 1 mill for police and 1 mill for fire that was originally approved in 1977. In addition, these millage requests have always had an expiration date on them, usually three or four years. The current millage renewal will be in place from 2006 to 2009, inclusive. One mill of levy equals \$1 per \$1,000 of taxable value of property.

PROPOSALS

Proposal 06-1

ABSENTEE BALLOTS are available at the Clerk’s Office. If you are sixty years of age or older, or expect to be absent from the community on Election Day, you qualify to vote by absentee ballot and may do so by filing an application for an absentee ballot. Voters on the Automatic Absentee Application list should have received their application for absentee ballot for the August 8th Primary and November 7th General Election back in June; however, if you did not return the application, or are not sure if you did, you might want to make arrangements to get an Absentee Ballot by calling or visiting the Clerk’s Office.

IF YOU PLAN TO VOTE IN THE POLLS: Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Election Day. Precincts 1 & 2 vote at Herbison Woods School. Precincts 3 & 4 vote at the Herbison Road Fire Station. Precincts 5, 6 & 7 vote at the Community Center on Brook Road. If you do not know your precinct, please call the Clerk’s Office.

INFORMATION IS THE KEY.....

Sometimes it's those little assumptions that confuse us. The things we don't really think about that may lead to misunderstandings or confusion. In future Newsletters we hope this section will be useful to our residents, clearing up those misunderstandings, eliminating confusion or just providing useful information.

Your Property Taxes – the basics.....

Have you ever wondered how your property taxes are determined or where that collected money goes? Understanding the following four components may help you understand.

- **Taxable Value (TV)** In 1994, the State Legislature passed what is known as Proposal A, which introduced TV to property owners. Under Proposal A, a property owner now has both a TV and a State Equalized Value (SEV). The SEV is one-half of the market value of your property. The SEV may rise as market rates tend to; however, unless there has been new construction or a transfer of ownership, the TV may only increase by the rate of inflation as determined annually by the MI Department of Treasury.
- The **Principal Residence Exemption (PRE)** status identifies whether or not the property is the owner's primary residence. If it is your primary residence, you are exempt from the School Operating Tax. To qualify, you must occupy the home by May 1st of the affected tax year. Your status as PRE exempt is shown on your tax bill.
- The third factor is the **School District**. Each district is responsible for the millages that are voted into that district. The school district also determines when the taxes are billed, whether the summer or winter tax bill. Every property owner in the Township is responsible for County, State Education, Township, Clinton Transit and Library District taxes. Which school district you reside in determines responsibility for local school, Intermediate school and LCC millages. Most districts have set amounts which they are allowed to collect; anything in excess has to be voted on by the people in that district. Within the Township, we have five different local school districts. Each district has a different millage rate.

- The last factor is **Special Assessments**. These additional costs, added to your tax bill, cover streetlights, drains, or delinquent sewer bills. These costs are billed to the property owners who benefit from the services. They are basically reimbursements of expenses for the service provided.

The property tax rate for townships is expressed in mills. A mill is one-tenth of a cent and will generate one dollar per \$1,000 of taxable value. The property tax formula is as follows:

$$(TV \times \text{Millages divided by } 1,000) + \text{Special Assessments} = \text{Property Tax}$$

The Township Treasurer collects taxes for all taxing authorities within DeWitt Charter Township. After collection, your tax dollars are disbursed to the proper school district, library, transit authority, and county.

THE IMPORTANCE OF TAX DAY

December 31st of each year is tax day, or the status day for the following year's assessed and taxable values computed by the Assessing Department. These values are used in the calculations of the July and December tax bills for that year. Tax day is, in effect, a "snapshot" of how the property exists at that time.

For most properties there is little change from one day to the next. But in the case of a property with an active construction project, the Assessing Department must determine the status of the project as of December 31st to calculate a "partial" property value.

In cases of "partial" construction, the Assessing Department will return during the next year to check the progress towards completion. At the conclusion of a building project, an appraiser from the Assessing Department will visit the property to collect the final information on building size, features, and quality of construction to assist in determining the assessed and taxable values for the next year. On larger projects, there may be several years of "partial" assessed and taxable values computed prior to completion.

Tax day also determines whether or not an item is assessable. For example, a new house constructed after December 31st would be taxed as a vacant lot for the remainder of the year. Residents who have just moved into a new home in March or April sometimes assume the assessment notice they received in February reflected the total value of their home. This is not true. For example, if a home is only 80% complete as of December 31st, the February assessment notice will reflect a "partial assessment" for the current year. It will be the following year when a full assessment is realized.

ADDITIONAL POLICE DEPARTMENT SERVICES

The DeWitt Charter Township Police Department offers a variety of services to the public. Detailed information on the services listed below can be obtained by contacting the Police Department administrative offices at (517) 669-6578 or by e-mail at police@dewitttownship.org.

Bicycle Licenses - Township residents can bring their bicycle to the Police Department to have the serial number and make/model recorded. A bicycle license will be provided which will aid in the recovery of the bicycle should it be lost or stolen. There is no charge for this service.

Fingerprinting - Non-criminal fingerprinting is often necessary to qualify for pre-employment or special licensure purposes. This service is provided during regular business hours of the administrative office. There are different procedures for fingerprint cards that will remain in-state and those which will be sent out-of-state. Please call ahead to ensure that the Township can process your request and that appropriate staff is available. There is a small fee for this service.

Handgun Registrations (Township Residents Only) - Residents who legally obtain a handgun through use of a pre-issued Permit to Purchase or with a Carrying Concealed Weapons (CCW) Permit (issued after July 1, 2001 only) may register their new handgun at the Police Department at no charge. This process is usually completed while you wait. A check of National law enforcement databases is run on the firearm to assure it has not been reported stolen. Then the firearm registration process, as required by State law, is completed and documentation of the new registration is provided to the buyer and the State. Gun locks are also available at no charge.

McGruff - The Police Department owns a McGruff costume and regularly provides McGruff appearances for community events. If you have an event and would like to include McGruff, please contact the administrative office to make your request.

Notary Service -The Police Department maintains staff with the ability to notarize documents. Please call ahead to ensure the appropriate staff is available. There is no charge for this service.

PBTs – Court Ordered - Courts will often require probationary conditions for subjects under their supervision to undergo Preliminary Breath Testing (PBT) to assure that no alcoholic beverages are being used. Township residents under these conditions may receive PBTs at no charge while non-residents of the Township will be charged a small fee for each PBT administered. This service is provided at the Police Department Monday through Friday (except on holidays) between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. and also between 6:45 a.m. – 7:15 a.m. & 6:45 p.m. – 7:15 p.m., seven days a week, including holidays.

Police Reports - Once approved, reports may be viewed at the administrative office during regular business hours at no charge. Copies of approved reports are available for a fee.

Property Checks - The Police Department will conduct periodic checks of your home while you are away for an extended period of time. Prior to your departure, call the administrative office during regular business hours to request this service. There is no charge.

Information Pamphlets - The Police Department has a variety of helpful handouts and pamphlets, including child safety, building security, home inventory, driver safety, and Child ID Kits which you may obtain by stopping by the administrative office during regular business hours. There is no charge for this service.

DEWITT AREA COMMUNITY READS

The DeWitt Public Library is establishing an exciting community program called “DeWitt Area Community Reads.” For those who haven’t heard of a community read program, the idea is simple: a book is chosen and folks in the community read the book as individuals, book groups, congregations, and families. After the book is read, there will be numerous activities tied to this shared experience.

The idea of a community read is not new – it was first done in Seattle in 1998 and has become so popular that the National Endowment of the Arts (NEA) has made community reads a high priority in its promotion of the arts. Locally, East Lansing is currently promoting their “One Book, One Community” program focusing on Jeanette Walls’ The Glass Castle.

For DeWitt, this year’s book choice is The Promise: A Moving Story of a Family in the Holocaust published by Penguin Books, London. It promotes the theme of tolerance and was co-written by a local author Barbara Powers with Eva Schloss, step-daughter of Otto Frank. Barb states, “The Promise has a message for everyone, for the story of Eva Schloss’ family speaks to the universal condition of humanity. It reminds us that life is precious and fragile, that the creative spirit is stronger than fear, that the power of good is immeasurable, and that love makes a difference.” The library is working with local businesses to purchase enough books to make them available to readers free of charge.

Events for the DeWitt Reads program will begin in October, starting with discussion groups and round tables. The events will culminate in March with an appearance by both authors. REMINDERS FOR THE FALL



If you use a wood burning stove or fireplace for supplemental or primary heat during the winter, don’t forget to have your chimney cleaned before the winter season. It is recommended that they be cleaned by a professional chimney sweep before the first log is lit each year.



After the leaves fall, don’t forget to clean the excessive build-up of leaves in roof valleys and gutters. Failure to do so is a factor in the formation of ice dams which form as snow accumulates at these locations. Ice dams result when the snow melts and later re-freezes as temperatures drop again each evening. After an ice dam is formed, water in subsequent melt/freeze cycles can be forced back up under the shingles and result in leaks into the house. It is important, therefore, to remove these leaves after they have fallen for the season and before the onset of snow and freezing temperatures. Besides preventing water problems, the life of your shingles will also be prolonged. It will also help if you keep excess snow from building up in valleys and along eaves by removing it with a snow rake, which is specifically designed to remove the snow without damaging the shingles.



One last caution about exterior holiday decorations. Decorations become more elaborate each year and although companies manufacturing lighting say they are for outdoor use, they still are only intended for temporary use. Exposure to rain, snow, sunlight, freezing and thawing temperatures, or other environmental conditions can take its toll on them and affect their condition. Make very sure that what you are using is approved for exterior use. It is probably safest to think of holiday lighting as temporary lighting which should not be exposed to the elements any longer than necessary.

DARA RECREATION NEWS & UPCOMING EVENTS

Winter Preschool Sports Starter - Preschool Sports Starter is a six week program that will teach participants the basic fundamentals and rules of t-ball, soccer and football. Winter sports starter will be offered on Tuesday nights at the DTCC from February 20-March 27, 2007. The cost is \$28 per participant for DeWitt Township and City residents and \$33 for all others. Every participant receives a t-shirt and participation medal. Registration runs from January 5-January 26, 2007 or until the program is full. Late registrations will be accepted after January 26th, with a \$10 late fee, until spots are full.

26th Annual Arts and Craft Show - The 26th Annual Arts and Craft Show at the DTCC will take place on Friday, November 3rd from 6:00-8:30 p.m. and Saturday, November 4th from 9:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. Over 50 booths are available for vendors or for shopping. The cost per booth is \$25 and includes one 8-foot table. The cost to shop is FREE! Concessions are available throughout the show. Support our local recreation programs by purchasing a raffle ticket for \$1 each or 6 for \$5. A minimum of one prize per hour is awarded with a homemade quilt for the grand prize. Registration is on-going and booths will be awarded on a first come/first serve basis.

Drop Your Kids Off (DYKO)

Nights-Drop your kids, ages 4-12, at the DTCC for a night of fun and games. Upcoming Drop Your Kids Off nights are November 17th and December 15th from 6:00-11:00 p.m. Pre-registration is required at least one week in advance. Kids will play gym games, complete arts and craft projects, watch a movie and have pizza and pop for dinner. The cost is \$15 for one child or \$25 for two children. Your kids will be supervised at all times and will not be allowed to leave the building.

All Day-Schools out and your kids need something to do? Drop your kids, ages 4-12, at the DTCC for an entire day full of programmed activities and games. All Day DYKO will be offered on January 27, 2007 when the DeWitt Schools are closed to students. Kids can be dropped off anytime after 7:30 a.m. and must be picked up

by 5:30 p.m. Lunch and an afternoon snack will be provided. The cost is \$25 for one child and \$40 for two children. Registration runs from January 5-January 25, 2007.

Happy Holiday Craft Night - This program, for all 5-10 year olds, will allow children to create and take home two holiday (winter or Christmas) themed crafts. "Craft Night" will take place at the DTCC on December 4th from 6:00-7:00 p.m. A small snack will be provided to all kids and parents. Registration is limited. A parent must accompany five and six year olds. Registration runs from November 3rd-December 1st. The cost is \$4 for DeWitt Township and City residents and \$5 for all others.

Dinner with Santa - Santa will be making an early appearance at the DTCC to have dinner and ask the kids of the DeWitt Community what they would like for Christmas. This program, open to all kids, will take place on December 18th from 5:15-6:15 p.m. (session 1) or 6:30-7:30 p.m. (session 2). All kids will receive pizza, a beverage and dessert for dinner before opening an early present from Santa. All participants will also receive a picture with Santa to take home. Registration is limited and runs from November 3rd-December 8th. The cost is \$6 per child and \$2 per adult for DeWitt Township and City residents and \$8 per child and \$3 per adult for all others. All children must be accompanied by an adult.

Youth Indoor Soccer - The youth indoor soccer league, offered to boys and girls in grades K-3 is back for a fifth season. This 5-on-5 league focuses on fun and skill development. Games will begin on January 6, 2007, and run for 6 weeks at the DTCC. The cost is \$28 for DeWitt Township and City residents and \$33 for all others. All participants receive a t-shirt and participation medal. Registration runs from November 17th-December 8th. Late registrations will be accepted after December 8th, with a \$10 late fee, until all available spots are taken.

Youth Basketball-Grades 3-12 - This 8 week league is available to boys and girls in grades 3-12. Games begin on Saturday, January 6, 2007(no games during mid-Winter break) and run through March 3, 2007. All games will be played at Herbison Woods School and the Jr. High School. Registration runs from November 17th through December 8th. Late registrations will be accepted after December 8th, with a \$10 late fee, until all available spots are full. The fee for DeWitt Township and City residents is \$38 for grades 3-6, \$50 for grades 7-8 and \$60 for grades 9-12. The fee for all others is an additional \$5. Participant fee includes a team t-shirt, participation medal and game officials (5/6 grade league and older). 9-12 grade participants may register individually or as a team.

Youth Basketball Camp - A beginner skills camp for boys and girls, ages 4-6, will begin on January 9, 2007. Camp will be held on Tuesday evenings with a game/award day on Tuesday, February 6, 2007. This 5-session camp will teach your child the basic skills of passing, dribbling, shooting, defense and team work. The cost for the camp is \$28 for DeWitt Township and City residents and \$33 for all others. Every camper will receive a t-shirt and participation medal. Registration runs from November 17th-December 8th or until the program is full. Late registrations will be accepted after December 8th, with a \$10 late fee, until all available spots are taken. Registration is limited so register early.

Youth Floor Hockey - Hop over the dasher boards at the DTCC and get ready to play! Youth Floor Hockey Leagues for grades K-5 begin on Saturday, February 17, 2007, and will run for 6 weeks through March 24, 2007. This instructional league focuses on sportsmanship, rules of the game, and most of all FUN! The cost is \$28 for DeWitt Township and City residents and \$33 for all others. All participants will receive a team t-shirts and participation medal. Players are required to provide their own eye protection. Registration is open from January 5 - January 26, 2007. Late registrations will be accepted after January 26, 2007, with a \$10 late fee, until all available spots are taken.

DNR Hunter Safety Class - This DNR sponsored course will be offered in mid-February at the DTCC for those 10 years and older to receive their certification. Participants 11 years and younger must be accompanied by an adult. Get a head start on next year's hunting season by getting your certification now. The cost is \$10 per student which includes all required class materials. Class dates will be February 12-February 15, 2007. Registration begins January 2, 2007. Register early because class size is limited.

Open Volleyball - Open Volleyball is now available on Wednesday and Sunday evenings from 7:00-9:00 p.m. for those age 18 and up at the DTCC. The cost is \$2 per person.
